A SPECIAL MESSAGE

State President Mary Lou Bradstreet delivered the following letter at our October meeting:

I would like to close with part of a speech given by a federal court judge in Indiana, my home state.

We are, indeed, sisters, and that term, "sisters," brings to mind something I read not long ago. The word "sister" is in fact used in building construction. It comes into play when a contractor has to stabilize a sagging joist — in say, a sagging floor or roof. The builders raise up and strengthen the weakened joist by attaching an additional framing member or two alongside the existing beam to strengthen it. That maneuver, where a primary beam gets beefed up by adding

an additional beam alongside the first one, lets the primary beam bear the needed load until the roof or floor itself can be straightened. And here's the clincher: those auxiliary beams that are placed alongside the primary beam are called "sisters." It's a perfect use of the word "sisters," and it tells you that, if we work together, maybe we can straighten up a whole lot of big messes. I do believe, despite the many challenges, that together as sisters we can find ways to make our society strong and straight and beautiful – true, you might say. Ever true!

I hope you are encouraged by this and remember that whatever it is that seems to be your "sagging floor" in life, you have many sisters ready to bolster you and support the weight of it. Each one of our scholarship or loan recipients is shored up a bit, as well, by "sister beams" that take some of the load of the cost of education. I am so grateful for P.E.O. Please go out and share your sisterly love for each other and together, we can do great things in this world.
